### **CORONA VIRUS UPDATE (COVID-19)**

The school receives regular updates from Public Health England containing advice and guidance on the evolving situation.

The latest advice is as follows:-

As of today (25<sup>th</sup> February) advice for returning travellers is as follows;

1) If you have returned from the following areas **since February 19**, call NHS111 to inform them of your recent travel, stay indoors and avoid contact with other people **even if you do not have symptoms**:

- Iran
- Specific lockdown areas in Northern Italy\* as designated by the Government of Italy
- Daegu or Cheongdo, Republic of Korea)
- Hubei province, China (returned in the past 14 days)

2) If you have returned from the following areas since **February 19th** and develop symptoms, however mild, you should stay indoors at home and avoid contact with other people immediately and call NHS111. **You do not need to follow this advice if you have no symptoms.**

- Northern Italy (see [map](#))
- Vietnam
- Cambodia
- Laos
- Myanmar

3) If you have returned to the UK from any of the following areas **in the last 14 days** and develop symptoms of cough or fever or shortness of breath, you should immediately stay indoors and avoid contact with other people, call NHS 111 to inform them of your recent travel to the country.

- Other parts of China outside Hubei province
- Thailand
- Japan
- Republic of Korea
- Hong Kong
- Taiwan
- Singapore
- Malaysia
- Macau

### **Preventing Spread of Infection**

There is currently no vaccine to prevent COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to avoid being exposed to the virus.

There are general principles anyone can follow to help prevent the spread of respiratory viruses, including:

- washing your hands often - with soap and water. This is particularly important after taking public transport
- covering your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throwing the tissue in a bin. See [Catch it, Bin it, Kill it](#)
- people who feel unwell should stay at home and should not attend work or any education or childcare setting
- avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands
- avoid close contact with people who are unwell
- clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces
- if you are worried about your symptoms or those of a child or colleague, please call NHS 111. Do not go directly to your GP or other healthcare environment

People who have returned from [Category 1 specified countries/areas](#) in the last 14 days should self-isolate. This includes avoiding attending an education setting or work until 14 days after they leave Hubei Province.

People who have returned from [Category 2 specified countries/areas](#) in the last 14 days, are advised to stay at home if they develop symptoms.

All other pupils or students and staff should continue to attend school or university, including their siblings attending the same or a different school (unless advised not to by public health officials).

**In school, we will be running class sessions on hand and respiratory hygiene.**

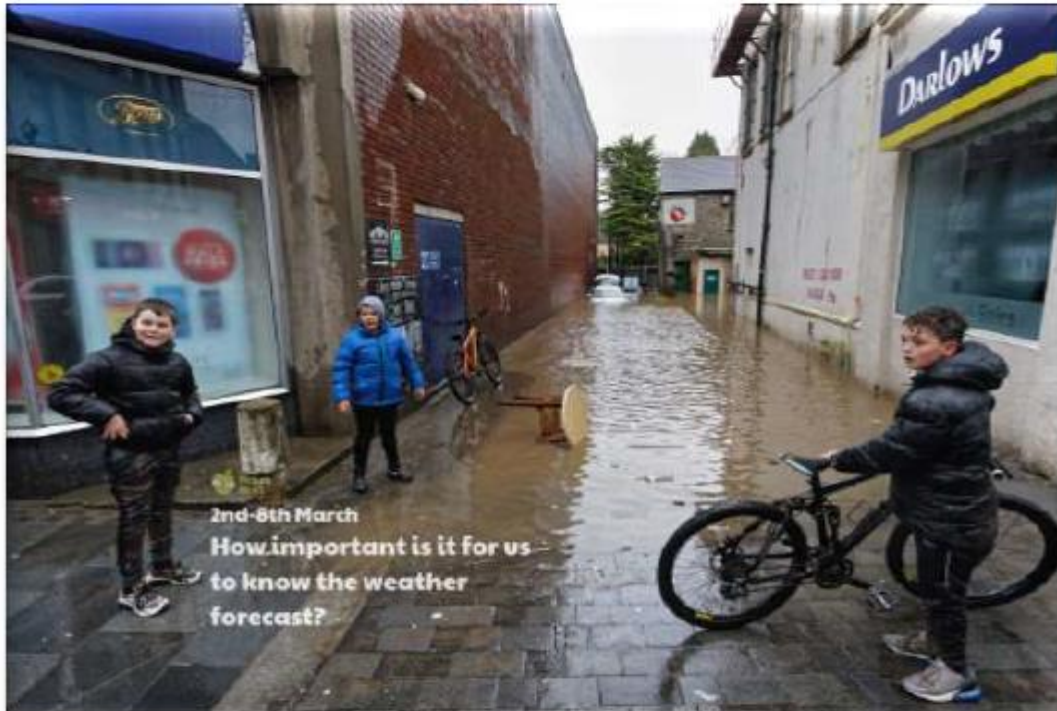

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## MESSAGE FROM OUR SCHOOL UNIFORM SUPPLIER

Dear Parents,

You may be aware that Mike Amesbury MP has tabled a Private Members Bill in the House of Commons regarding affordability and availability of school uniform, the 1<sup>st</sup> reading of this bill occurs on 13<sup>th</sup> March 2020.

Schoolshop are members of The Schoolwear Association and I sit on the Executive Committee of The SA, the aim of which is to foster best practice, promote the benefits of school specific uniform and provide advice to interested parties (e.g. The Dept for Education, Politicians, Schools, MAT's, etc) in relation to supply of school uniform.

This Private Members Bill has the potential to change the landscape of school uniform supply in England and to ensure the bill is debated fully and all information and opinions are taken into account, The Schoolwear Association has engaged with a number of politicians and other stakeholders to outline a clear and accurate picture of the situation pertaining to school uniform supply. This engagement will continue as this situation unfolds.

To help improve the clarity of the situation The Schoolwear Association have produced 2 surveys, 1 for schools/school leaders & 1 for parents.

The opinion of parents and guardians is extremely valuable, The Schoolwear Association has invested a great deal of time and energy into a strategy to deal with this situation and it may be the case that this could be the largest survey of it's kind in England as schoolwear retailers throughout England have been asked to contact schools and parents, for their opinion on this subject.
